Special Film Event Celebrates Local Success in Helping Individuals with Disabilities

Cincinnati World Cinema and The Hamilton County Board of MR/DD will present two screenings of THE CATS OF MIRIKITANI, at 12:30 and 3:00 pm on Saturday April 12 at the Cincinnati Art Museum. The special screening will benefit the MR/DD and highlight the success of that agency in providing housing and support services for local individuals with disabilities.

THE CATS OF MIRIKITANI is one of those rare finds in the documentary film world -- a first directorial work that engages and entertains while addressing serious subjects. The film celebrates the resilience of the human spirit and the healing power of art, friendship and compassion. It has garnered "Best Documentary" and "Audience Favorite" awards at over 30 festivals in the U.S. and around the world, including Tribeca, Palm Springs and Tokyo.

The film's central character, a survivor of the World War II internment camps, is Japanese American painter Jimmy Mirikitani. When we meet him in the film he is an elderly homeless man living on the streets of New York, where he is taken in and helped by the filmmaker and social service agencies. After his live-changing experiences, Jimmy now has his own apartment, is happily self-sufficient and shares his art with his neighbors and the community

Mr. Erpenbeck will lead the post-film discussion after each of the Saturday afternoon screenings.
