Fresh from the recent Oscar shortlist for Best Documentary Film, **NANKING** is about the 1937 Japanese conquest of China's capitol city Nanking and the atrocities of the subsequent occupation, commonly known as the "Rape of Nanking."

Oscar-winning directors Bill Guttentag and Dan Sturman bring us the story of a few Americans and Europeans who elected not to abandon the doomed city when those who could do so fled. Instead, they resolved to protect those who remained behind, creating a "safety zone" credited with saving a quarter-million Chinese from annihilation.

Interviews with actual survivors, both Chinese and Japanese, are riveting. First-hand accounts, in the form of diaries and letters written by safety zone committee members, come to life in coordinated readings. We hear the words and feel the emotions of college administrator and missionary Minnie Vautrin, German businessman John Rabe, American surgeon Bob Wilson, and others, as they bear witness to the harrowing events in what had become hell-on-earth.

Archival newsreel footage, combined with photos and 16mm film shot by American missionary John Magee, are skillfully interwoven with the interviews and readings. The result is deeply moving, as the film puts the viewer on the streets of Nanking and brings the forgotten past to startling life.

**NANKING** is an important film - a powerful and emotional reminder of the heartbreaking toll war takes on the innocent – particularly relevant in light of current conditions world-wide. It is a testament to the courage and conviction of individuals who were determined to act in the face of evil and a powerful tribute to the resilience of the Chinese people.
