"THAT OLD BLACK MAGIC" Honors Jazz Heritage

Rarely seen performances by Duke Ellington, Ella Fitzgerald and eight other artists will screen in Cincinnati, followed by live jazz performance.

Big screen presentation of "buried treasures" a first for this region, perhaps the U.S., brings an important piece of history to Cincinnati.

Cincinnati World Cinema and the Phi Psi Omega chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority will present three screenings of "THAT OLD BLACK MAGIC" at 3pm Sunday February 22; 7pm Tuesday February 24 and 7pm Wednesday February 25 at The Redmoor in Mt. Lookout Square.

An accidental discovery – 18 cans of film found behind a brick wall in a Toronto home – led to lost kinescope film recordings of musical variety shows produced by Norman Sedawie for the Canadian Broadcasting Company (CBC) in the late 1950s and early 1960s. Largely blocked by segregationist television policies in the U.S. at that time, African American vocalists and musicians were warmly welcomed by the CBC.

Restored by CBC archivists and technicians for the Canadian network's 50th anniversary celebration, Cincinnati World Cinema will present highlights of performances by **Duke Ellington**, **Ella Fitzgerald**, **Nat King Cole**, **Sarah Vaughan**, **Sammy Davis Jr.**, **Dinah Washington**, **Cab Calloway**, **Della Reese**, **Billy Eckstine** and **Marion Anderson**. **Never aired and rarely**, **if ever**, **presented on the large screen in the U.S.**, **Cincinnati audiences will see Ellington**, **Fitzgerald and Calloway in their prime**, and the young faces and voices of Vaughan, Davis, Washington and Reese.

With roughly four decades in the music business, renowned Cincinnati jazz saxophonist Bruce Menefield will share historical perspective with the audience after each screening and then lead a set of period songs in tribute to the featured artists in the film. The Sunday matinee will include guest vocalist Brenda Flowers and bass player Eddie Brookshire, a post-film hors d'oeuvre reception, all included with the price of admission. The Tuesday and Wednesday screenings will include a cash bar available before and after (but not during) the film and feature a performance by Menefield on sax and Erwin Stuckey on keyboard.

Proceeds from these events will benefit Phi Psi Omega's scholarship fund for college bound students in the Cincinnati metropolitan area.
